

Great River Children's Museum

Appropriate \$250,000 in 2020 and \$275,000 in 2021 from the arts and cultural heritage fund to develop a children's museum in central Minnesota

The Great River Children's Museum will...

- **develop foundational skills in young children.**

Children's museums combine learning with play in environments that are engaging, fun and developmentally appropriate for children ages 0-10. Art, science, math, literacy and other exhibits and programs would be valuable supplements to early childhood and K-12 programs in our area.

- **strengthen family connections through creativity, exploration and play.**

Children's museums are places away from work and household distractions, where parents and other caregivers can be entertained, learn something new, and experience the luxury of quality time with the children in their lives.

- **serve as a town square to bring community members together.**

The well-being of children is a strong motivator for community investment and action. A children's museum will engage families, individual citizens, schools, and area businesses to share their talents and perspectives in order to create and operate a valuable community resource.

- **address community diversity in a unique way.**

Children's museums are popular sources of information, attract a diverse cross-section of people and provide shared experiences through interpretive and interactive exhibits. In the St. Cloud community, we have an opportunity to create museum programs and exhibits that include stories of both recent immigrants and long-term residents of our area, building bridges of understanding across cultures and times.

- **contribute to the local economy as a destination attraction.**


Children's museums are sought after as local and travel destinations. More than 30 million individuals annually visit children's museums around the world. Children's museums in similar sized Midwest communities have attracted 60-100,000 visitors each year.

Next steps:

Address immediate safety concerns in order to host a series of “Play, Explore & Learn Labs” in our building and gather community input.

Work with an architectural firm and museum planners to create a master plan for the museum.

Launch a capital campaign for a phased approach to remodeling and museum exhibit development.

Excitement for this project begins with children and grows

The Great River Children’s Museum has garnered community wide support that continues to grow. We have volunteers from all sectors of the community including health care, education, business and finance assisting with everything from technology to marketing. We have raised nearly \$200,000 in funds from individuals, aided in part by a successful \$25,000 matching campaign. Support begins locally with the mayor and city council and extends to the Minnesota Children's Museum and nationwide to the Association of Children's Museum of which we are a member organization. We are in collaboration with the Stearns History Museum, our local United Way, and area schools to name just a few. In a touching show of support, one group of homeschoolers reached out to us because they voted to give the proceeds from their annual fundraiser to the Great River Children’s Museum. Each year, students and parents in the group create arts and crafts which they sell to raise money for a local charity. This year they wanted to support an organization that shares their values of creating space in children's lives for learning through play and the importance of adults creating, exploring and discovering the world alongside children.
