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Subject: Mercury Product Restrictions

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Overview

A comprehensive bill that further regulates mercury-containing products and prohibits their sale in the state.

Section

1 Adds a fluorescent or high-intensity discharge lamp containing mercury to other products that can't be disposed of in solid waste or a wastewater treatment system, but it must be disposed in a lamp recycling facility. States new labeling requirements for fluorescent or high-intensity lamps, as well as for lab 2 chemicals, reagents, fixatives and electrodes. Requires utilities that send fluorescent or high-intensity lamps containing mercury to their 3 customers provide mercury information on their web site and advertising. Mandates after August 1, 2007, that a sphygmomanometer containing mercury may not be 4 sold in the state. Mandates after August 1, 2007, that an esophageal dilator, or similar tubes containing 5 mercury may not be sold in the state. Mandates after August 1, 2007, that certain thermostats using mercury switches may not be 6 sold in the state. 7 Mandates after August 1, 2007, that certain mercury switches or relays may not be sold in the state, except for existing medical equipment where no compatible mercury component

not be sold in the state.

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Mandates after January 1, 2008, that gas ovens and stoves containing mercury switches may

Mandates after January 1, 2008, that barometers and manometers with a mercury-containing

device may not be sold in the state.

- Mandates after January 1, 2008, that an over-the-counter pharmaceutical product containing mercury may not be sold in the state.
- Mandates after January 1, 2008, that a cosmetic or toiletry product containing mercury may not be sold in the state.
- Defines "mercury-containing product."
- Requires a lamp recycling facility permit or license contain an annual report by March 1, 2008, to the Pollution Control Agency on the number and type of lamps received.
- Prohibits a school, excluding home schools, from purchasing or using mercury products, except for certain thermostats in the school.
- Requires a notice with certain mercury-containing products and proper disposal information to be posted in a conspicuous manner by anyone selling fluorescent lamps.
- Requests the University of Minnesota mortuary science program to do a feasibility study to look at best practices for removing mercury amalgam fillings and related social concerns, with a report back to the appropriate legislative committees.
