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## **Section**

**Definitions.** Adds § 325F.172. "Children's product" means a product designed for or intended for use by a person under three years of age, including a toy; clothing; a product to facilitate sleep or feeding; and products to be applied to the skin of or taken internally by a child.

Provides an immediate effective date for this section.

**Bisphenol-A in children's products; ban.** Adds § 325F.173. Bars, beginning January 1, 2009, a person from selling or offering for initial sale at retail in this state, a children's product containing bisphenol-A.

Provides an immediate effective date for this section.

- **Phthalates in children's products; ban.** Adds § 325F.174. Bars, beginning January 1, 2009, a person from selling or offering for initial sale at retail in this state:
  - a children's product containing the chemicals DEHP, DBP or BBP in concentrations exceeding 0.1 percent, including plastic tubing or a container used to administer a solution to a child; or
  - a children's product that can be placed in a child's mouth that contains DINP, DIDP or DNOP in concentrations exceeding 0.1 percent.

Provides an immediate effective date for this section.

**Replacement chemicals.** Adds § 325F.175. Prohibits a manufacturer from replacing bisphenol-A or phthalates as a result of the prohibitions above with a chemical classified as known or reasonably anticipated to be a human carcinogen according to the National

Toxicology Program's Report on Carcinogens, or is identified by the Environmental Protection Agency as causing birth defects or reproductive or environmental harm.

Provides an immediate effective date for this section.

5 Participation in interstate clearinghouse. Adds § 325F.176. Permits the state Pollution Control Agency to participate in the establishment of a multi-state clearinghouse to identify children's products containing bisphenol-A and phthalates and to evaluate safer alternatives.
