Subject Amending the statute of limitations for the crime of surreptitious

intrusion

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### **Overview**

Minnesota establishes statutes of limitations in criminal cases. After the specified period of time expires, a person cannot be convicted of a crime. Some crimes, such as homicide, sexual assault, sex trafficking, and labor trafficking of a juvenile have no limitations period. Other offenses like labor trafficking of an adult, financial exploitation, and arson have specific limitations periods of five or six years. For most other crimes, the limitation is three years from the date of the offense. This bill makes the statute of limitations for surreptitious intrusion three years from the date of offense or three years from the date of discovery, whichever is later.

#### 1 Limitations.

Establishes that the statute of limitations for the crime of surreptitious intrusion is the later of three years from the date of offense or three years from the discovery of any photograph or recording obtained in violation of the law.

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
