1.2 relating to capital investment; authorizing spending to acquire and better
1.3 public land and buildings and other improvements of a capital nature with
1.4 certain conditions; modifying previous appropriations; reducing prior bond
1.5 authorizations; authorizing the sale of state bonds; appropriating money;
1.6 amending Minnesota Statutes 2010, sections 16A.641, subdivisions 4a, 7;
1.7 16A.642, subdivision 2; Laws 2006, chapter 258, sections 7, subdivision 3,
1.8 as amended; 16, subdivision 5, as amended; 17, subdivision 8, as amended;
1.9 Laws 2008, chapter 179, sections 15, subdivision 8; 18, subdivisions 3, 6, as
1.10 amended; 19, subdivision 4; 24, subdivision 4; Laws 2008, chapter 365, section
1.11 4, subdivision 3, as amended; Laws 2009, chapter 93, article 1, sections 14,
1.12 subdivision 3; 22; Laws 2010, chapter 189, sections 6, subdivisions 2, 4; 7,

1.16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.17 Section 1. **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.**

1.18 The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.19 bond proceeds fund, or another named fund, to the state agencies or officials indicated,
1.20 to be spent for public purposes. Appropriations of bond proceeds must be spent as
1.21 authorized by the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, paragraph (a), to acquire
1.22 and better public land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature, or
1.23 as authorized by the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, paragraphs (b) to (j),
1.24 or article XIV. Unless otherwise specified, money appropriated in this act for a capital
1.25 program or project may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed directly
1.26 to the capital program or project in accordance with accounting policies adopted by the
1.27 commissioner of management and budget. Unless otherwise specified, the appropriations
1.28 in this act are available until the project is completed or abandoned subject to Minnesota
1.29 Statutes, section 16A.642.

6.21 (HEAPR), under subdivision 2. After
6.22 each sale of general obligation bonds, the
6.23 commissioner of management and budget
6.24 shall notify the board of the amounts assessed
6.25 for each year for the life of the bonds.

6.26 (b) The commissioner of management and
6.27 budget shall reduce the board's assessment
6.28 each year by one-third of the net income
6.29 from investment of general obligation bond

14.2 new agreements and amend past agreements
14.3 with landowners as required by Minnesota
14.4 Statutes, section 103F.515, subdivision
14.5 5, to allow for restoration, including
14.6 overseeding and harvesting of native prairie
14.7 vegetation for use for energy production in
14.8 a manner that does not devalue the natural
14.9 habitat, water quality benefits, or carbon
14.10 sequestration functions of the area enrolled
14.11 in the easement. This shall occur after seed
14.12 production and minimize impacts on wildlife.
