INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

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The following House Files were introduced:

Marquart, Johnson, Bierman, Brand, Winkler and Schultz introduced:

H. F. No. 2912, A bill for an act relating to human services; establishing a onetime grant for a pilot project to serve victims of elder abuse; appropriating money.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Jurgens introduced:

H. F. No. 2913, A bill for an act relating to state government; appropriating money for marked Trunk Highway 316 improvements.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Morrison, Hausman and Davnie introduced:

H. F. No. 2914, A bill for an act relating to natural resources; requiring a comprehensive review of mining; appropriating money.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Policy.

Edelson introduced:

H. F. No. 2915, A bill for an act relating to taxation; estate; providing for a deceased spousal unused exclusion amount; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, sections 289A.38, by adding a subdivision; 291.016, by adding a subdivision.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Taxes.

Huot, Layman, Sandstede, Baker, Lislegard, Backer, Munson, Ecklund and Sundin introduced:

H. F. No. 2916, A bill for an act relating to health; requiring hospitals to provide patients with information regarding costs of transportation via an air ambulance service; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, sections 62J.823, by adding a subdivision; 144E.121, by adding a subdivision.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

Elkins introduced:

H. F. No. 2917, A bill for an act relating to data privacy; requiring controllers to provide, correct, or restrict processing of personal data upon a consumer's request; requiring controllers to provide a privacy notice and document risk assessment; providing for liability and civil penalties; providing the attorney general with enforcement authority; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 325E.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Judiciary Finance and Civil Law Division.
