 8.11 second year are for payments to county and
 8.12 district agricultural societies and associations
 8.13 under Minnesota Statutes, section 38.02,
 8.14 subdivision 1. Aid payments to county and
 8.15 district agricultural societies and associations
 8.16 shall be disbursed no later than July 15 of each
 8.17 year. These payments are the amount of aid
 8.18 from the state for an annual fair held in the
 8.19 previous calendar year.

8.20 (b) \$2,000 the first year is for a grant to the

12.3 **Sec. 4. FARM SAFETY GRANT AND OUTREACH; APPROPRIATION.**

12.4 (a) \$125,000 in fiscal year 2021 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner
12.5 of agriculture for farm safety grants and outreach programs under Minnesota Statutes,
12.6 section 17.1195. Of this amount, \$75,000 is for grain storage facility safety grants, and
12.7 \$50,000 is for (1) outreach, which may include creating and presenting a grain storage
12.8 facility safety curriculum, and (2) awarding grants under paragraph (b). This is a onetime
12.9 appropriation.

12.10 (b) The commissioner of agriculture may award grants to the Board of Regents of the
12.11 University of Minnesota or the Board of Trustees for the Minnesota State Colleges and
12.12 Universities to design digital applications that allow a user to remotely power off a grain
12.13 storage facility via cell phone or electronic device. Any digital applications created as a
12.14 result of this grant must be made available to the public at no cost. By January 15, 2021,
12.15 the commissioner shall report on the grants issued under this appropriation to the members
12.16 of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over agriculture finance and higher education
12.17 finance. By February 1, 2022, a recipient of a grant for this purpose is requested to report
12.18 to the commissioner of agriculture and the members of the legislative committees with
12.19 jurisdiction over agriculture finance and higher education finance regarding the digital
12.20 application produced as a result of the grant.

12.21 **Sec. 5. VETERINARY DIAGNOSTIC EQUIPMENT; APPROPRIATION.**

12.22 \$675,000 in fiscal year 2021 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner
12.23 of agriculture for a grant to the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota to purchase
12.24 testing equipment for the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory, including but not limited to
12.25 equipment and supplies needed to respond to incidents of African swine fever. This is a
12.26 onetime appropriation.

12.27 **Sec. 6. APPROPRIATION; FARM CRISIS LOAN ORIGINATION FEE GRANT**
12.28 **PROGRAM.**

12.29 (a) \$175,000 in fiscal year 2020 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner
12.30 of agriculture for grants to eligible farmers who have been approved for farm debt
12.31 restructuring loans guaranteed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA),
12.32 Farm Service Agency, or issued under a loan program administered by the Rural Finance

13.1 Authority. The commissioner must award an eligible farmer a grant in an amount equal to
13.2 the loan origination fee amount required for the farmer to obtain the USDA, Farm Service
13.3 Agency guaranteed loan, or Rural Finance Authority program loan.

13.4 (b) For purposes of this section, "eligible farmer" means an individual who regularly
13.5 participates in physical labor or operations management in the individual's farming operation
13.6 and files "Schedule F" as part of the person's annual Form 1040 filing with the United States
13.7 Internal Revenue Service or a family farm organized under Minnesota Statutes, section
13.8 500.24, if the individual or family farm:

13.9 (1) has a total net worth of less than \$800,000 in calendar year 2020; and

13.10 (2) is either in mediation proceedings under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 583, or has
13.11 received a mediation notice under Minnesota Statutes, section 583.26, subdivision 1,
13.12 paragraph (a).

13.13 (c) The commissioner must give first priority to grant applicants who are currently in
13.14 mediation under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 583, and must give second priority to grant
13.15 applicants who have received a mediation notice under Minnesota Statutes, section 583.26,
13.16 subdivision 1, paragraph (a).

13.17 (d) The amount appropriated under this section is onetime and is available until June
13.18 30, 2023.

13.19 (e) The commissioner may use up to ten percent of the amount appropriated under this
13.20 section to administer the grant program.

13.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

13.22 Sec. 7. **APPROPRIATION; RETAIL FOOD HANDLER SAFETY.**

13.23 (a) \$125,000 in fiscal year 2020 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner
13.24 of agriculture for grants to retail food handlers, as described in Minnesota Statutes, section
13.25 28A.05, paragraph (a). The commissioner may adjust the grant amounts specified under
13.26 this section based on the total amount of money requested in the applications, and the
13.27 availability of federal money for a similar purpose. The commissioner may award grants
13.28 for recipients to execute requirements, guidance, and recommendations related to the
13.29 infectious disease known as COVID-19 provided by the Centers for Disease Control and
13.30 Prevention and the Minnesota Department of Health, and to develop safety procedures,
13.31 update and retrofit retail locations, purchase personal protective equipment for employees,
13.32 and educate the public on the need to follow safety procedures. This is a onetime
13.33 appropriation and is available until June 30, 2021.

14.1 (b) Grants under this section equal \$500 for stores that qualify as retail food handlers.
14.2 The commissioner must not award a business with multiple eligible locations more than
14.3 \$2,000 in total grants. Applicants must provide information to the commissioner on how
14.4 grant money will be used to ensure safety of Minnesotans from COVID-19.

14.5 (c) The commissioner of management and budget must determine whether any of the
14.6 expenditures an appropriation is made for under this section is an eligible use of federal
14.7 funding received under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act,
14.8 Public Law 116-136, title V. If the commissioner of management and budget determines
14.9 an expenditure is eligible for funding under title V of the CARES Act, the amount for the
14.10 eligible expenditure is appropriated from the account where CARES Act money has been
14.11 deposited and the corresponding amount appropriated under this section cancels to the
14.12 general fund.

14.13 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

14.14 **ARTICLE 2**

14.15 **STATUTORY PROVISIONS**

14.16 Section 1. **[17.1195] FARM SAFETY GRANT AND OUTREACH PROGRAMS.**

14.17 Subdivision 1. **Tractor rollover grants.** (a) The commissioner may award grants to
14.18 Minnesota farmers and Minnesota schools that retrofit eligible tractors with eligible rollover
14.19 protective structures.

14.20 (b) Grants for farmers are limited to 70 percent of the farmer's documented cost to
14.21 purchase, ship, and install an eligible rollover protective structure. The commissioner must
14.22 increase a farmer's grant award amount over the 70 percent grant limitation requirement if
14.23 necessary to limit a farmer's cost per tractor to no more than \$500.

14.24 (c) Schools are eligible for grants that cover the full amount of a school's documented
14.25 cost to purchase, ship, and install an eligible rollover protective structure.

14.26 (d) A rollover protective structure is eligible if it is certified to appropriate national or
14.27 international rollover protection structure standards with a seat belt.

14.28 (e) "Eligible tractor" means a tractor that was built before 1987.

14.29 Subd. 2. **Grain storage facility safety grants; farm safety outreach.** (a) The
14.30 commissioner may award grants to Minnesota farmers who purchase eligible grain storage
14.31 facility safety equipment. Grants are limited to 75 percent of the farmer's documented cost

15.1 to purchase, ship, and install grain storage facility safety equipment, or \$500 per bin or silo,
15.2 whichever is less.

15.3 (b) Eligible grain storage facility safety equipment includes:

15.4 (1) fall protection systems;

15.5 (2) engineering controls to prevent contact with an auger or other moving parts;

15.6 (3) dust collection systems to minimize explosion hazards;

15.7 (4) personal protective equipment to increase survivability in the event of a grain bin
15.8 related emergency;

15.9 (5) grain silo air quality monitoring equipment; and

15.10 (6) other grain storage facility safety equipment approved by the commissioner.

15.11 (c) The commissioner may create a farm safety outreach campaign, including but not
15.12 limited to development and distribution of safety educational materials related to grain bins,
15.13 silos, and other agricultural confined spaces.

15.19 A person who is required by statutes administered by the Department of Agriculture, or
15.20 by rules adopted pursuant to those statutes, to provide a suitable water supply, or plumbing
15.21 or sewage disposal system shall not engage in the business of manufacturing, processing,
15.22 selling, handling, or storing food at wholesale or retail unless the person's water supply is
15.23 satisfactory pursuant to rules adopted by the Department of Health, the person's plumbing
15.24 is satisfactory pursuant to rules adopted by the Department of Labor and Industry, and the
15.25 person's sewage disposal system satisfies the rules of the Pollution Control Agency. This
