

1.1 Lesch from the Judiciary Finance and Civil Law Division to which was referred:

1.2 H. F. No. 1520, A bill for an act relating to public safety; requiring 911 dispatchers to
1.3 be trained to provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction; providing for monitoring
1.4 and enforcement; establishing civil immunity; appropriating money; amending Minnesota
1.5 Statutes 2018, section 403.03.

1.6 Reported the same back with the following amendments to the first division engrossment
1.7 (DIVH1520-1):

1.8 Page 2, line 30, delete everything after "(a)"

1.9 Page 2, delete lines 31 and 32

1.10 Page 3, delete lines 1 to 9

1.11 Page 3, line 10, delete "(c)"

1.12 Page 3, after line 14, insert:

1.13 "(b) Telephone cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction is a general duty to the public
1.14 rather than a special duty owed to individuals, and a 911 telecommunicator must exercise
1.15 judgment and discretion in performing actions including but not limited to:

1.16 (1) determining whether a particular situation requires instituting the cardiopulmonary
1.17 resuscitation program;

1.18 (2) determining whether a caller refuses or is otherwise unable or unwilling to provide
1.19 cardiopulmonary resuscitation or receive telephone cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction;

1.20 (3) using and appropriately adapting an evidence-based protocol or script for providing
1.21 cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction based on individual callers and emergency
1.22 situations presented by callers; and

1.23 (4) determining when to transfer a caller to another public safety answering point with
1.24 911 telecommunicators that have received training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation."

2.1 With the recommendation that when so amended the bill be returned to the Committee
2.2 on Ways and Means.
