



## Governor's 2021 Supplemental Budget

On March 18, Governor Walz released his revised 2022-21 biennial budget, which adds approximately \$87 million for education, bringing the new total education investment to about \$745 million. The additions to the budget bill are the following:

- **Compensatory aid hold harmless**
  - Guarantees at least the same average compensatory revenue per student in fiscal year (FY) 2022 as districts received in FY 2021
  - \$68 million in one-time funding – will be paid out 90% in FY 2022 and 10% in FY 2023
- **Tribal contract aid hold harmless provision**
  - Adds one-time declining enrollment to Tribal Contract Aid, based on 20.5% of the general education formula allowance (same as for school districts and charter schools)
  - \$50,000 one-time increase
- **Student support personnel for cooperatives and intermediates**
  - \$1.7 million for FY 2022 and FY 2023 (two years)
  - \$950,000 per year in ongoing funding
  - Increases the per student amount for Intermediate school districts and other cooperatives from \$4 to \$6 per student
  - This funding serves the state's highest need students
- **Additional funding for non-exclusionary discipline training**
  - Increase of \$7.5 million for FY 2022 and FY 2023
  - Original recommendation from the Governor was \$1.25 million per year
  - Governor's recommendation is now \$5 million per year on-going
- **Additional funding for out-of-school tutoring opportunities**
  - \$10 million for FY 2022 and FY 2023
  - Original recommendation from the Governor was \$3.25 million for summer
  - This adds \$5.0 million per year in ongoing funding
- **Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate (AP/IB) science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) Grant**
  - Programmatic changes to allow for greater participation and access to rigorous courses statewide
