### **Bill Description**

Crimes motivated by bias reporting expanded, property damage crime motivated by bias amended, Peace Officer Standards and Training Board bias training required, law enforcement agencies adoption of standard policies regarding crimes motivated by bias required, grant programs established and funded, and other money appropriated.

#### **Assumptions**

The Department of Human Rights does not currently investigate, report on, or analyze hate crimes in Minnesota. This bill would create a new area of work for the Department. The Department currently investigates protected class discrimination cases and receives reports of general bias incidents as part of that work. The Department reports on investigations to the legislature every six months as part of current reporting obligations.

This bill adds significant new data collection responsibilities for the Department, including ongoing intake of information from the public and organizations reporting hate crimes. It would also require capacity to analyze and report on this data. This will require hiring staff with expertise in this area.

This bill adds new duties to the Department creating responsible for training and policy development in collaboration with the POST Board related to bias-motivated incidences. This will require hiring staff with expertise in this area.

The Department will need to update its OnBase database software to account for new data collection responsibilities, these upgrades would be one-time costs.

The effective dates for MDHR are July 1, 2023.

#### Expenditure and/or Revenue Formula

The costs for this proposal are ongoing. MDHR assumes a 3% compensation cost increase from FY24 to FY25.

## **Bill Description**

Section 1 of the bill (20) requires the commissioner of the Department of Human Rights (DHR) collaborate and consult with the Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) regarding the training of peace officers in identifying, responding to, and reporting crimes motivated by bias pursuant to sections 626.8451, subdivision 1, and 626.8469.

Section 8 of the bill amends 626.8451, subd. 1, described in paragraph a, requiring the POST Board to approve a list of training courses to assist peace officers in identifying and reporting crimes motivated by bias. This section also requires final approval of the course list by the commissioner of DHR.

Section 9 of the bill amends 626.8469, subd. 1, described in paragraph a, by adding mandatory training on responding to crimes motivated by bias, incorporated in the existing 16 hours of mandated training for each officer's three year licensing cycle. The bill further requires that the training objectives be reviewed every three years.

## Assumptions

Assumes that POST Board staff (primarily the Continuing Education (CE) Coordinators) will work with DHR to develop/update CE learning objectives during the next peace officer licensing cycle (begins July 1, 2023 and ends June 30, 2026). This will require approximately 40 hours of staff time to coordinate the development of the learning objectives, gain approval of the DHR commissioner and promulgate that information to training providers. It is further assumed that the review of courses every three years will require minimal staff time.

## Expenditure and/or Revenue Formula

40 hours of professional staff member time at \$59.00 per hour (includes fringe), 40 x \$59.00 = \$2,360.00

## Long-Term Fiscal Considerations

Once the learning objectives are completed, long term costs for POST should be minimal.

#### **Bill Description**

House file 181 would require the Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety to expand the reporting for crimes motivated by bias. It would expand the definitions of bias for crimes of assault, property damage, and harassment. It would require the Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training to update training in recognizing, responding to, and reporting bias crimes. The bill would also make appropriations to the Department of Human Rights to compile reports on crimes of bias, and to make grants to nonprofits to collect and report data on what may be crimes motivated by bias. The bill would also provide funding to the Office of Justice Programs in DPS for grants to nonprofits to provide support services to victims of crimes of bias.

#### **Assumptions**

There is insufficent information to determine the impact of the bill on caseloads. In any event the cases that may be involved here would likely be charged without these changes, so the impact on caseloads would be minimal.

### **Bill Description**

Section 1: Requires the Department of Human Rights to collaborate and consult with the Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training regarding training of peace officers in identifying, responding to, and reporting crimes motivated by bias, including but not limited to the duty of peace officers to report crimes motivated by bias.

Also requires the Department to solicit, receive, and compile reports from organizations, schools, and other entities regarding crimes that they believe are motivated by the victim's or another's actual or perceived race, color, ethnicity, religion, sex, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, age, etc. This information is permitted to be gathered to develop data on crimes motivated by bias then provide said data on the Dept.'s website.

Section 2: Modifies the definition of assaults motivated by bias to include other biases.

Section 3: Modifies felony assault motivated by bias to include other biases.

Section 4: Modifies criminal damage to property in the second degree to include additional biases, reorganizes format.

Section 5: Modifies criminal damage to property in the third degree to reflect additional biases, reorganizes format.

Section 6: Modifies aggravated violations for harassment and stalking to reflect additional biases, reorganizes format.

Section 7: Modifies the requirement that a peace officer to report crimes motivated by bias, which is to be sent to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA), to reflect additional biases and crimes that should be accounted for in consideration of the need to report. This language makes no change to the content of the reporting form to be submitted to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension.

Section 8 & 9: Modifies the training course on crimes motivated by bias to reflect additional biases and to require the POST Board to review the approved courses every three years then update the list of approved courses, in consultation with the Commissioner of Human Rights, who must approve the list, if needing updates. Also requires in service training.

HF 181 requires the Department of Human Rights to solicit, receive, and compile reports from community organizations, school districts and charter schools, and individuals regarding crimes a community member or community organization believes are motivated by bias as defined in statute. The Commissioner of Human Rights must provide information on the Department's website about when and how a victim reports criminal conduct to a law enforcement agency.

HF 181 directs the Department of Public Safety, Office of Justice Programs to administer grants to nonprofit organizations to provide support services for victims of crimes where there is a reasonable belief that the crimes were committed due to bias against protected classes as defined in state statute.

HF 181 directs the Department of Public Safety, Office of Justice Programs to administer grants to nonprofit organizations to collect and report to the Commissioner of Human Rights data on crimes where there is a reasonable belief that the crimes were committed in whole or in part because of actual or perceived bias.

HF 181 allows the Department of Public Safety, Office of Justice Programs to retain 4% of the grant appropriation for administration.

#### **Assumptions**

#### Bureau of Criminal Apprehension

The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) will continue to collect data on the newly updated crimes motivated by bias when peace officers, and therefore their departments, are required to report the incidents.

All peace officers employed by the BCA will participate in the requisite training regarding crimes motivated by bias as a part of their 16 continuing education credits per three-year licensing cycle. The number of continuing education credits necessary for each peace officer to complete within each three-year licensing cycle will not change, in spite of the content change of these credits. Therefore, individuals will not need to be absent from work for any additional time and work at the BCA will not be fiscally impacted by additional absent hours.

The BCA operates the Statute Service that documents criminal offenses and is used by all portions of the criminal justice community.

The Statute Service will need to be modified to reflect the changes made by the bill. It is assumed that the costs of making the requisite changes will be under \$5,000.00.

#### Office of Justice Programs

The Department of Public Safety, Office of Justice Programs assumes funding for grants in Section 11 and Section 12 will be awarded based on a competitive Request for Proposal.

The Department of Public Safety assumes 4% of the grant appropriation will be available for grant administration costs.

Assume the grant appropriation amount is unknown at this time.

#### Minnesota State Patrol

Additional In-Service Training time required would not result in extending the entire training curriculum into an additional day, which would incur expenditures related to lodging and per diem. The bill expands the definitions of crimes of bias and includes additional training in conjunction with implicit bias, which is already being taught.

#### Expenditure and/or Revenue Formula

## <u>BCA</u>

As the BCA currently collects data on the crimes motivated by bias, the change in definitions of crimes and modifications to the need to report will have no fiscal impact on the BCA.

Assuming the costs of modifying the statute service will be under \$5,000.00 and the BCA will absorb this expense.

### **Bill Description**

The bill relates to bias motivated incidents and crimes. It expands reporting requirements of incidents and appropriates training funding for peace officers.

Sections 2 through 6 amend the elements of the crimes of assault motivated by bias, criminal damage to property in the second and third degrees motivated by bias, and harassment motivated by bias under Minn. Stat. section 609.2231, subdivision 4; 609.2233; 609.595, subdivisions 1a, 2; and 609.749, subdivision 3. A person's ethnicity, gender, gender identity, and gender expression are added to the list of attributes that may qualify as biased motivations; and the qualifying motivations are amended to include the victim's association with a person or group of a certain actual or perceived attribute on the list. For the criminal damage to property offenses, the bill specifies that the biased motivation need not be the entire motivation, and clarifies that intent to intimidate or harm satisfies the elements of the crime.

Sections 2 through 6 are effective August 1, 2023, and apply to crimes committed on or after that date.

#### Assumptions

It is assumed that due to the COVID-19 health pandemic, the cases sentenced in 2020 and 2021 are not necessarily fair approximations of cases sentenced in the future.

It is assumed that expanding the elements may cause some expansion of the number of cases sentenced. Because the existing offenses are sentenced so rarely, however (8 cases sentenced from 2011 to 2021, resulting in no prison sentences during those 10 years), it is assumed that this expansion will cause minimal impact on state and local correctional resources.

### **Bill Description**

HF181-1UE amends Minn. Stat. § 363A.06 (Powers and Duties of Commissioner of Human Rights) at subdivision 1 to require peace officer training and reporting on crimes motivated by bias; Minn. Stat. §§ 626.5531, subd. 1 (reporting of crimes motivated by bias) and 626.8451, subd. 1 (training course; crimes motivated by bias) to clarify the references to and requirements regarding crimes motivated by bias; and Minn. Stat. § 626.8469, subd. 1 (in-service training required) to add requirements related to crimes motivated by bias.

The bill also amends Minn. Stat. §§ 609.2231, subd. 4 (assaults motivated by bias); 609.2233 (felony assault motivated by bias); 609.595, subds. 1a and 2 (criminal damage to property in the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> degree); and 609.749, subd. 3 (aggravated harassment) to clarify the elements of the bias-related crimes.

The bill also appropriates money to the commissioner of human rights for training and reporting, and to the commissioner of public safety for the Office of Justice and the commissioner of human rights for grants to nonprofit organizations.

#### **Assumptions**

It is assumed that because the provisions of this bill clarify the existing language governing bias-related crimes, and because all of these crimes can be charged under existing law with or without an allegation relating to bias, the bill will not increase case filings but instead will perhaps impact the rate of conviction for cases filed under the existing statutes.

## Expenditure and/or Revenue Formula

The bill is not anticipated to have a significant fiscal impact on the judicial branch.
