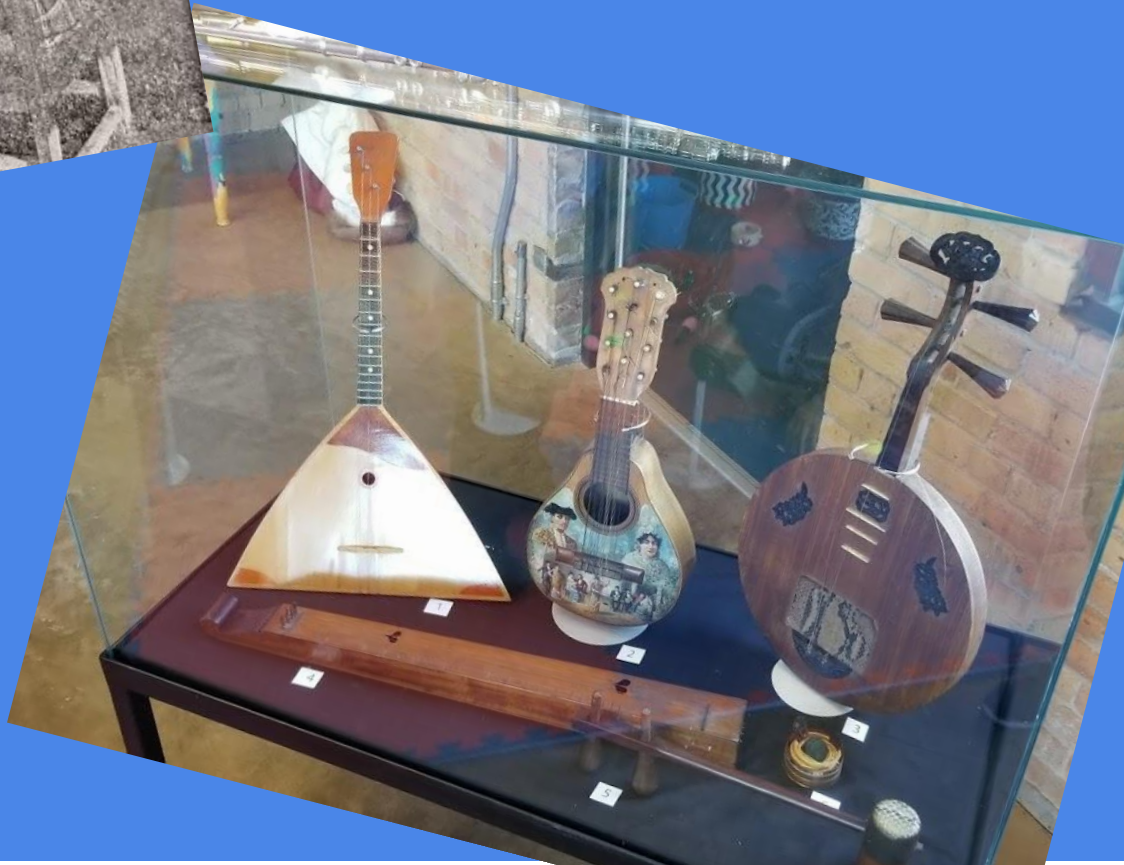

Warriors of Africa

The shield and spears shown here are from the collection of the British Museum. They were used by warriors in the region of the Great Lakes in East Africa. The shield is made of wood and animal skin, and the spears are made of wood and iron. The shield is decorated with a pattern of small holes, which were used to create a rattling sound when the shield was struck. The spears are made of wood and iron, and the iron tips were used for hunting and warfare.
