
Tackling housing instability across Minnesota

## The state of homelessness in Minnesota

With rent and home prices rising faster than wages, there is a shortage of affordable housing options across the state. Minnesota has experienced significant growth in demand for housing, which has only been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

- 8,000 people experience homelessness nightly. 1,650 people sleep outside.
- In Greater Minnesota, the number of unsheltered people increased by nearly one-third (32%) between 2019 and 2020.
- 64% of adults experiencing homelessness have a serious mental illness and 24% have a substance use disorder.
- Housing provides a strong foundation for improved outcomes for homeless families, youth, and older adults. Housed people experience:
  - Decreased involvement in child welfare
  - Improvement in mental health
  - Decreased use of emergency room and hospital resources
  - Decreased likelihood of returning to homelessness

**Return on investment:** The total cost of public services for two years on the streets was \$187,288 compared to \$107,032 for two years in permanent housing with support services which is a savings of \$80,256 or almost 43%.

## AmeriCorps is part of the solution

AmeriCorps is a national movement for positive social change. A new program, Heading Home Corps, helps to support people experiencing housing instability.

Nonprofits and government agencies need additional capacity to address increasing rates of homelessness. Heading Home Corps assists by providing Housing Resource Navigators to help expand capacity and help more people secure stable housing. Housing Resource Navigators serve full-time helping people to access resources, develop action plans and build necessary skills in order to gain and maintain stable housing, a prerequisite for making other improvements in life such as searching for a job and addressing mental or physical health.

H.F. 4277 (Koegel) and S.F. 4207 (Dziedzic) appropriates \$1,100,000 in fiscal year 2023 for a grant to ServeMinnesota to fund Heading Home Corps and provides base funding of \$1,100,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$1,100,000 in fiscal year 2025.


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# Locations

## What Housing Resource Navigators do:

- Create and implement a housing stabilization plan, including how to obtain documentation and budget for housing
- Coordinate with and support landlords in accepting rental assistance
- Connect people to resources for employment, food, mental health, substance use recovery, and finances
