Student Basic Needs Resource Hub

Partnership with Greater Twin Cities United Way

- » Students Text MNHELP to 898211 or call 211 toll free, confidential, 24/7 support
- » Over 1200 students have utilized the resource hub in the first year
- » Top three basic needs areas students seek support:
 - Food Insecurity
 - Housing Insecurity
 - Mental Health
- » First of its kind partnership in the United States

Supporting Basic Needs, Mental Health & Other High Need Student Supports

- \$2 million dollars directly allocated to improve/increase campus-based supports related to students' basic needs security, good mental health, and other high need student support services/resources
 - Each college and university submitted a funds utilization description which detailed how the funds would be used and outlined impact evaluation measures determined by each college and university
 - Examples include:
 - Increased clinical mental health and clinical health services on-campus and virtually (including new clinical positions)
 - Emergency grants for students' basic needs
 - Increased support for food pantries: supplies, facilities, and access
 - Increased support for transportation, housing & technology insecurity
 - Increased support for students who are parenting
 - Additional opportunities for peer-to-peer support; wellness, resilience, health-promotion, and evidence-based mental health and suicide prevention programming and trainings

Statewide Support

Supplemental Clinical Mental Health Support

- > Accessible for all students at all 33 colleges and universities
- Robust process underway that includes students, faculty, and staff to identify technology that provides the support functionality needed.
- Goal of implementation by fall 2024.

Equitable Distribution of Student Emergency Grant Funding

- Engaged in contract negotiations with an industry leading technology to support an app-based, bias free, electronic application for students with robust data analytics at campus and system level.
- Campus personnel will make grant application decisions, and can use data to provide additional supportive measures for students
- ➢ Goal of implementation in spring 2024.

Assessment and Professional Development Opportunities

- Engaged in a partnership with the Hope Center at Temple University to assess the prevalence of basic needs insecurity and the impact of basic needs and mental health initiatives.
- Goal of implementation in spring 2024.

Z-Degree Implementation & Savings \$8,551,400 Cost Savings

Return on investment of >**\$7 per student for each \$1 invested** in the creation and implementation of Z-degrees.




Equity and Opportunity Gap

OER/Z-Degree Course Success

+ 2.8% PASS RATE for OER sections*



Difference in pass rates between OER sections and all sections of the same course varies significantly

➤41 of 67 OER sections had a higher pass rate than all sections of the same courses

Campus One-Time Operation Support

The Legislature provided \$50 million of one-time funding in FY2024 for campus support

- » Funding was allocated to all colleges and universities based on each institution's estimated tuition revenue loss due to declines in enrollment from FY2019 to FY2023
- » The bill includes a floor of \$300,000, so no college or university received lower than that amount
- » College and university amounts were distributed in September after FY2023 enrollment numbers were finalized

Minnesota State Stabilization

The Legislature provided \$128 million for stabilization

- » \$61.5 million in FY2024 and \$60.5 million in FY2025 for the campuses, with \$38 million ongoing in the tails
- » Allocated to colleges and universities using the system's allocation model for general operating funds
- » Allocations were provided to colleges and universities in May for use to finalize FY2024 budgets
