1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 120A.41, is amended to read:
1.8	120A.41 LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR; HOURS OF INSTRUCTION.
1.9	(a) A school board's annual school calendar must include at least 425 hours of instruction
1.10	for a kindergarten student without a disability, 935 hours of instruction for a student in
1.11	grades 1 through 6, and 1,020 hours of instruction for a student in grades 7 through 12, not
1.12	including summer school. The school calendar for all-day kindergarten must include at least
1.13	850 hours of instruction for the school year. The school calendar for a prekindergarten
1.14	student under section 124D.151, if offered by the district, must include at least 350 hours
1.15	of instruction for the school year. A school board's annual calendar must include at least
1.16	165 days of instruction for a student in grades 1 through 11 unless a four-day week schedule
1.17	has been approved by the commissioner school board under section 124D.126 124D.122.
1.18	(b) A school board's annual school calendar may include plans for up to five days of
1.19	instruction provided through online instruction due to inclement weather. The inclement
1.20	weather plans must be developed according to section 120A.414.
1.21	<b>EFFECTIVE DATE.</b> This section is effective for the 2023-2024 school year and later.

Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 124D.12, is amended to read: 2.1 124D.12 PURPOSE OF FLEXIBLE LEARNING YEAR PROGRAMS. 2.2 Sections 124D.12 to 124D.127 authorize districts to evaluate, plan and employ the use 2.3 of flexible learning year programs. It is anticipated that the open selection of the type of 2.4 flexible learning year operation from a variety of alternatives will allow each district seeking 2.5 to utilize this concept to suitably fulfill the educational needs of its pupils. These alternatives 2.6 must include, but not be limited to, various 45-15 plans, four-quarter plans, quinmester 2.7 plans, extended learning year plans, and flexible all-year plans. A school district with an 2.8 approved four-day week plan in the 2014-2015 school year may continue under a four-day 2.9 week plan through the end of the 2019-2020 school year. Future approvals are contingent 2.10 upon meeting the school district's performance goals established in the district's plan under 2.11 section 120B.11. The commissioner must give a school district one school year's notice 2.12 before revoking approval of its flexible learning year program. 2.13 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for the 2023-2024 school year and later. 2.14 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 124D.121, is amended to read: 2.15 **124D.121 DEFINITION OF FLEXIBLE LEARNING YEAR PROGRAM.** 2.16 "Flexible learning year program" means any district plan approved by the commissioner, 2.17 or for a four-day school week schedule, by a school board, that utilizes buildings and facilities 2.18 during the entire year or that provides forms of optional scheduling of pupils and personnel 2.19 during the learning year in elementary and secondary schools or residential facilities for 2.20 children with a disability. 2.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for the 2023-2024 school year and later. 2.22 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 124D.122, is amended to read: 2.23 124D.122 ESTABLISHMENT OF FLEXIBLE LEARNING YEAR PROGRAM. 2.24 (a) The board of any district or a consortium of districts, with the approval of the 2.25 commissioner, may establish and operate a flexible learning year program in one or more 2.26 of the day or residential facilities for children with a disability within the district. Consortiums 2.27 may use a single application and evaluation process, though results, public hearings, and 2.28 board approvals must be obtained for each district as required under appropriate sections. 2.29 The commissioner must approve or disapprove of a flexible learning year application within 2.30

2.31 45 business days of receiving the application. If the commissioner disapproves the

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3.1	application, the commissioner must give the district or consortium detailed reasons for the
3.2	disapproval.

- 3.3 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a), a school board may adopt a four-day school week
- 3.4 schedule without seeking commissioner approval if the annual school calendar meets the
  3.5 hours of instruction requirements in section 120A.41.
- 3.6 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for the 2023-2024 school year and later.

## 3.8 **124D.127 TERMINATION OF FLEXIBLE LEARNING YEAR PROGRAM.**

- 3.9 The board of any district, with the approval of the commissioner of education, may
- 3.10 terminate a flexible learning year program in one or more of the day or residential facilities
- 3.11 for children with a disability within the district. This section shall not be construed to permit
- an exception to section 120A.22, 127A.41, subdivision 7, or 127A.43. A board may terminate
- 3.13 <u>a four-day school week schedule plan without seeking the approval of the commissioner.</u>
- 3.14 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for the 2023-2024 school year and later.

## 3.15 Sec. 6. FOUR-DAY SCHOOL WEEK; RULE AMENDMENT.

- 3.16 The commissioner of education must amend Minnesota Rules, part 3500.1000, to remove
- 3.17 the commissioner's authority over approving or disapproving four-day school week programs
- 3.18 under Minnesota Statutes, sections 124D.12 to 124D.127. The commissioner may use the
- 3.19 good cause exempt process under Minnesota Statutes, section 14.388, subdivision 1, clause
- 3.20 (3), to adopt the rule required under this section.
- 3.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.
