

Aspiring Educators Speak Up for Student Teacher Support

9 out of 10 schools are currently significantly affected by the teacher shortage, according to the latest PELSB report. We need to support student teachers to attract more young people into this essential profession.

Enrollment for future teachers in our higher education programs across the state are **half of what they were a decade ago.** Waiving tuition during our mandatory semester of student teaching in our public schools would go a long way to help. Few students take other classes during this time, and are working full-time assisting teachers, helping students and serving as another adult in the room during the educator shortage. Future teachers face significant student debt and low starting salaries compared to other sectors, and this is one way to address worries around paying student loans as they're starting in the profession.

As of now, the Office of Higher Education has a student teacher stipend program that caters to specific shortage areas, but it lacks applicants and reach. Our bill expands eligibility to all aspiring educators, as every topic area is a shortage area currently in Minnesota, while setting a standard stipend that amounts to \$15 an hour, addressing the increased cost of living during college students' mandatory student teaching semester. Student teaching is a full-time job, and many of these students struggle to keep their part-time or full-time afterschool jobs to make ends meet.

We asked college students in teacher preparation programs what financial support in the form of student teacher pay and waived tuition would mean for them and their future.

Please consider the following thoughts and stories from student teachers and aspiring educators across the state.

Emily Stiverson

University of Minnesota Duluth

I would be able to afford food and essential goods and products. Currently I can only buy cheap quality food and a small amount of it. I also am struggling to afford basic products like feminine hygiene. Most of my money goes to gas, I travel 26.6 miles to the school and another 26.6 miles back to campus. I am struggling having enough money to afford an oil change which is needed for my car.

Lily Kieser

Winona State University

During student teaching, students are expected to "work" full-time at school and still pay tuition for the credits.

This is incredibly difficult to manage when students need to pay for rent, gas, and insurance, if they are told to quit their current job or told that they cannot have a job while student teaching. Having student teaching be a paid position would allow students to be supported financially so they can keep paying rent, gas, groceries, and insurance.

Henry Kellerhuis

As a current student teacher if I were paid for the work that I am currently doing, I wound not have to work a part time job on top of the responsibilities of being a full time teacher, and student to be able to pay groceries and survive. If I did not luck into only having to teach 2 classes for my first 8 weeks, so I could complete my EdTPA during that time and my last 8 weeks transferring over to a new classroom who already has the entire curriculum made and planned



months in advance, I would not be able to survive on my own. I would be required to take out additional loans which likely would not hit my bank account in the time I would need them or receive handouts from family. Student teaching is a requirement for us to get our teaching license and this isn't a typical 9-5 student internship where once you leave you are done for the day. As a student teacher you have the full responsibility as a classroom teacher, as a student, while also not getting paid. In fact we have to pay to be there in the first place by having to pay for tuition. Other higher respected disciplines and careers like engineering, your internships that you have to complete to graduate are typically paid.

Teaching is a career, that is facing incredible scrutiny in the media currently and is experiencing a nationwide shortage. One of the ways we can mitigate this issue is make the individuals who actively want to pursue a career in student teaching feel respected and able to live by offering them some financial compensation for the very real work and important service we provide to the nation's youth.

Getting paid while doing my student teaching will mean getting it done quicker than having to be off for 12 weeks and unpaid. I won't have to work evenings or overnights 7 days a week on top of the student teaching hours to get by to make money for my bills. I live with my boyfriend and my dog and although he makes good money, in this economy we cannot afford for me to not get paid for 12 weeks. I get my health insurance benefits through my job and having to take off for my student teaching would mean I wouldn't be able to have that for that specific year. I am more immune sensitive and that makes me fearful of what that could look like.

Student teaching is the most important part about the schooling to become a teacher. It is how we learn the main part about being a teacher. I think that it is very important that student teachers devote all of their attention in to their student teaching, instead of having to worry about working in order to make rent and have groceries. Since student teaching is usually at the end of college, I know that I will have student loans and will be poor due to paying for college. Student teaching is already a full-time job. It is unreasonable to assume that I would also need to have a part-time job. Being paid during student teaching would change my life completely. I find that I am burnt out even further with the stress of taking a 3-4 month pay break from a job. Student Teaching in itself is a full-time job, we don't have the time (or energy) to pack up our bags and put on a uniform to go wait tables. Being paid during student teaching would lift a huge weight off of our shoulders and allow to be completely attentive to the tasks at hand!

I have to work and complete my student teaching at the same time. Unless I work nights, I don't have time for work and my school work. It's really difficult to afford to live when I'm paying my own tuition in addition to living expenses. It's scary to think about my student debt as well as credit if I can't work while teaching.

Jamie

University of Minnesota Duluth Grad 2010 (currently an elementary teacher, not a college student) I wouldn't have had the stress and struggle to stay above water.

When I was in college, I got pregnant my junior year. I went to classes until I had him in late November. When my son turned 9 months old, I started up my courses again part-time while working full-time between 3 group homes on the days I had no class and every weekend. After my son turned two, I returned to college courses full-time while still working full-time. Before he turned 2 1/2 years old, I was a single mom after discovering ongoing infidelity of his father. When my son turned 4, it came time for student teaching, and college students who worked had to prove they were serious about their student teaching and future profession by showing two paystubs "proving" they were not working more than 20 hours a week at their job. It was in fact recommended we not work at all due to three courses also being required alongside student teaching. I was a single mom of a 4 year old with a mortgage, daycare and preschool costs, and made just enough to get by but made too much for any assistance. For one month, I worked 20 hours a week to have paystubs "prove" my seriousness, and opened up a credit card to buy food, gas, and pay bills. I went back to working full-time, however took a significant pay cut due to needing to do sleepover nights instead of my typical weekday shifts. After that semester, I was in credit card debt of +\$4,000. After student teaching, I needed to have an additional job to help pay this new credit card bill. I paid the minimum monthly payment, which made no dent to my debt as it mostly just paid the interest. After 5 years, I got help from an outside agency to pay off the actual balance only and close the card account.

Andrew Chang

Spending numerous hours as a full-time student teacher is a tremendous commitment. Essentially, student teaching is a full semester of working for free and living off of a loan, savings, and others, which is not guaranteed for many people. I stress about my financial future everyday because of the unpaid student teaching. I am currently in block one and I am an RA on campus. Because of my time commitment in the classroom, to my classes and the hours of homework, and my unpaid RA job I cannot work. I have no time to work. The fact that the next two years will be the same way makes my anxiety get out of control. I cannot RA next year. I have to to work 50-70 hour weeks in the summer to manage the cost of rent in Duluth because I cannot work while I am student teaching. Paid student teaching is the only fair option when you take away our time to even work.

I am a single parent, and sole provider for myself and my 6 year old son. I am currently attending the Para-SPED program at Southwest Minnesota State University, and I will be completing my student teaching hours next year. The way the Para-SPED program works, is that students can work half the day as a paraprofessional, and the other half of the day will be for us to complete our student teaching hours. Because, we will only be student teaching half the day, we will spend a whole school year completing this process. That means for a whole school year, I will only get paid half the day. The closer this process gets, the more anxious I become. I am very concerned with how I will be able to provide for my son and myself with only half of my income. I also live in a very rural area, so finding work during the summer is extremely difficult. Paraprofessionals in my area do not get paid during the summer. The opportunity for us to collect unemployment during the summer helped a little bit this past summer, but I still struggled financially until I started getting a full paycheck at work. I cannot imagine what my expenses will look like after a summer with half of my income from unemployment, and then a whole school year with only half my income. I have even considered dropping out of the program, because I am so worried about how I will be able to pay for my house, my car, my insurance, and food for myself and my son. This paid student teaching opportunity would change my life, and take a lot of anxiety off my chest. It will give me the opportunity to make mine and my son's lives better, without first making it harder.
